

All neutral wires in the distribution box should be grounded

Neutral wires are grounded only at the main service panel or first service disconnect; they should not be grounded in subpanels or downstream distribution boxes. Main Panel vs Subpanel In a standard electrical system, the neutral wire serves as the return path for current under normal operation, while the ground wire is a safety path for fault currents. According to NEC Article 250, the neutral and ground are bonded together only at the main service panel or first service disconnect. This connection, called the main bonding jumper, establishes a zero-voltage reference point and ensures that fault currents can safely trip overcurrent protective devices. In subpanels or downstream distribution boxes, the neutral and ground must remain separate. Connecting them together in subpanels can create dangerous neutral currents on metal parts, increasing the risk of electric shock or fire. The neutral bus in a subpanel should carry only return current, while the ground bus provides a low-impedance path for fault currents. Safety and Function Proper grounding and bonding: Stabilizes system voltage relative to earth and limits overvoltages. Provides a safe path for fault currents, allowing breakers to trip quickly. Prevents neutral currents from flowing on conductive surfaces in subpanels, which could energize metal enclosures. Summary Main service panel: Neutral and ground are bonded; neutral is grounded to the earth via a grounding electrode conductor. Subpanels/distribution boxes: Neutral and ground are kept separate; only the ground is connected to the panel enclosure and grounding system. Never double-tap neutrals or connect them to ground in subpanels, as this violates NEC rules and creates safety hazards. Following these practices ensures both electrical safety and proper operation of overcurrent protective devices throughout the system.
