

How to number the electrical distribution boxes for workshop equipment

Step 3: Number Circuits by Importance and Sequence

Start numbering at the incoming power source and proceed sequentially through the circuits. Prioritize circuits by electrical importance: main bus, transformer feeders, high-load equipment (e.g., welders, air compressors), then general-purpose outlets. For subpanels, continue the sequence logically to avoid duplication.

Step 4: Label Panels Clearly

Place a durable label on the front of each panel showing the panel ID and voltage rating, e.g., "MAIN 240V L.V. SWITCHBOARD – M1". Include a circuit directory inside the panel door listing each circuit number, its load, and location. This aids troubleshooting and maintenance.
