

How to remove the outer sheath from a 48-core optical cable

The edge of the stripped jacket should be clean and straight, not jagged or torn .Additional Tips Progressive Layer Stripping: For multi-layer cables, strip each layer individually—outer jacket first, then aramid yarn, then buffer tubes .Avoid Excessive Force: Do not bend, crush, or...
