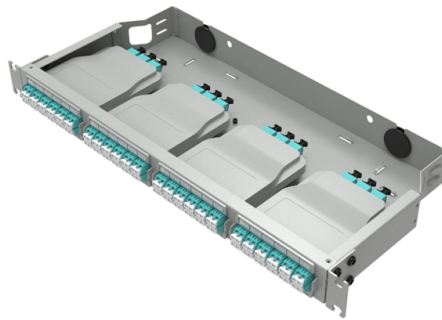


How to run cables without using cable trays
