However, if the tray only carries metallic-sheathed cables, the cable sheath provides the fault path, and the tray itself is not considered live, so earthing may not be required (Tradeskills4u) . For non-metallic sheathed cables, the tray is generally safe to touch under normal conditions, as the cables provide Class II protection, and earthing the tray could even increase shock risk (Forum Automation) . Best Practices Always test cables with a voltage detector before handling. Assume all cables are live until confirmed otherwise. Follow proper earthing and bonding protocols based on whether the tray is an exposed or extraneous conductive part. Avoid overloading trays to prevent overheating and fire hazards. Maintain structural integrity and clear debris to reduce physical and electrical risks (Apex Tray) . In summary, while not all cables in a tray are necessarily live, safety protocols dictate treating them as live until verified, and the tray's earthing requirements depend on the type of cables and its conductive role in the system.
